More than leaving us feeling disconnected from one another, it also has a big impact on the bottom line of the organization. "Each year, we raise

approximately \$500,000 from events like Golf & Glory, the Auction and our Memorial Golf Outing, not to mention other events held by groups across the state," said Christina Ferris, SLC development director. "So this year, we're getting creative!"

With the assistance of the newly formed development committee, SLC is looking at

new ways to hold events. The Memorial Golf Outing was the first. "We were sticking our toes in the waters of virtual fundraising with this," said Christina. "We wanted to retain the fun, laid back atmosphere of this particular outing, while at the same time remembering a friend of the Center." Jerry D'Adamo, a great friend of SLC who passed away in 2019, was recognized in a moving tribute.

The "outing" allowed participants to golf at the course of their choice the week of July 11th – 18th and send their scores to SLC. Because of the added flexibility of a virtual event, walkers were included for the first time. Sponsorships were available, as well as mulligans at varying

price points to help offset the cost of care for residents.

On July 18th, SLC recognized sponsors, as well as winners and losers in a fun, virtual event live on Facebook. "We chose a platform most people were familiar with for the event," said Christina. "The best part was picking the winner of the Crazy Pants Contest from the pictures participants sent of themselves wearing their wildest golf pants or exercise gear. Everyone had

a great time with it!" The outing was a great success, raising \$15,000 to care for residents at SLC.

The development committee is looking down the road to fall fundraisers, as well, holding a 60th Anniversary Celebration (originally planned for June) and the beloved fall auction online. Stay tuned for more details.

### From Fr. Enzo

The pandemic has challenged everyone mentally, physically, emotionally and spiritually. We hope and pray that it will be over soon and that everyone could go back to normalcy.

Thus, I want to thank all of you for caring for St. Louis Center through your generosity and concerns in knowing how the residents have

been doing. The Good Lord has blessed us and as of now no one, either residents or staff, has been sick with COVID-19.

Because of the pandemic, many fund raising events have been cancelled or postponed; my worry has always been the wellbeing and health of people above the money raised for the financial needs of the Center. We keep our faith in the Lord who 'doesn't forget those who are precious in His sight' (St. Louis Guanella) and cares for them in many different ways through the generosity of loving people.

We had planned a celebration for the 60th anniversary of the Center, but it had to be cancelled due to the pandemic; we hope to organize an event for next year.

The Memorial Golf Outing in the middle of July became a virtual one. The cruise scheduled for Spring 2021 has been cancelled and we are looking at other opportunities for the Fall of 2021. The event (9-20) at the Italian American Club of Livonia has been cancelled. The Car-Show (9-27), the Taste of Chelsea at St. Mary's (10-10), and the Fall Auction (11-14) have been cancelled as well.

The construction of the buildings in St. Louis Guanella Village resumed in the middle of June and should be completed by the end of August. At that point we will make plans for a formal dedication.

St. Louis Center, as you know, continues its founding tradition of caring for people who cry out 'Lord I don't have anyone' keeps offering care and advocates for the rights of the people with intellectual and developmental disabilities who are fully members of society and who give it major hidden contributions of humanity through their lives.

Following these thoughts, we are looking at the new needs of the present aging population in Fr. Guanella Hall and assessing the programs and services to offer them in order to proclaim the dignity of their lives.

The pandemic has also put a lot of stress on staffing needs; suddenly we had to increase the number of staff to cover the morning hours for schools and day programs being shut down. Starting at the end of June, only a day program for the adult population has reopened on a part time basis. We keep working on contingency plans for the future to be ready in case the pandemic will last longer than expected.

**Keeping Residents Active** 



With this time in quarantine, we have been providing opportunities to keep our resident's minds and bodies active. As an Occupational Therapy student, I have an interest in everyday actives that provide meaning

to lives, as well as, work on different performance skills. In the past few months, we have provided many activities that range from playing games to getting active. Some examples



include playing Uno, baking, walking, and chair yoga. Each activity provides an opportunity for the resident's to work on different sets of skills. Playing cards and baking can give the resident's an opportunity to work on processing and social skills. This is through choosing the correct tools necessary for the task, inquiring when help is needed, taking turns, and transitioning throughout the task. Walking and chair yoga provide practice for gross motor skills. These types of physical activities can benefit overall fitness but also



coordination, endurance, pacing, bending, reaching, and crossing the midline. Other activities include painting, wii bowling, reading as a group, and holiday crafts. Each activity not only providing entertainment during quarantine, but

also benefiting our resident's skills needed for their everyday occupations.

Our maintenance crew drove lawn mowers in the parade to provide more entertainment. The priests and supervisors walked with the adult residents and waved to the children. ### **Advocacy**

### Political Advocacy: State Legislators & Together for Choice

During the second quarter of 2020, we have had to face one of the most difficult challenges in our lifetime in fighting and containing the COVID-19 pandemic. And while we've written previous articles about the impact of this virus on St. Louis Center, what has been done politically during the past three months? Once the "stay home" executive order was issued by the governor, not only were many of us confined to working from home, but so were our elected officials and their staffs. This provided us with an opportunity to get caught up with them on some of our major issues and to ask them for continued help and support. State Sen. Lana Theis asked us to provide her with documentation for how money allocated for persons with I/DD flowed from the Federal Government to the State Government, and then out to the local community through the County Community Mental Health system. So we provided her and other legislators with information specific to SLC in order to illustrate this process.

The MI Department of Health and Human Services has continued to move forward with it's Five Year Transition Plan to revise the requirements for Home and Community Based Services in Michigan. This program is specific to adult residents, and St. Louis Center must be in full compliance with the State's new regulations by September 17, 2021. Drawn from Federal CMS Guidelines, the program is meant to ensure that people with I/DD are not isolated from the community.

SLC has become partners with Together for Choice; a national advocacy organization that advances the rights of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

### **Matching Grant Helping SLC Celebrate 60 Years**

You have been very generous to St. Louis Center through our spring Covid relief appeal and other fundraisers. In fact, more than 340 people responded with donations- and we couldn't be more grateful.

Looking forward, we know that the challenges will continue. Funding cuts of 20% or more from state and federal funders are on the horizon. Staffing costs, including a \$2 an hour hazard pay premium, will continue to be higher than normal



for the remainder of the year. Cleaning supplies, PPE and increased food costs add to the list. Our in-person fundraisers are pivoting to virtual events, or are being postponed, providing us with fewer funds to offset these deficits.

Even in the face of this uncertainty, however, we

take heart in the fact that St. Louis Center has a long history of providing loving care for people with I/DD—this year celebrating our 60th anniversary! Although we do not know with any certainty what the next year will bring, we have faith in you, our family, who help ensure that the 73 children and adults entrusted to our care will always have a home. Our histories together go back generations, with Fr. Fortunato,

Fr. Joe, Fr. Enzo and others—serving at weddings, christenings, funerals and many family celebrations. And we will continue to be there with you in the future.

We are grateful for your past support



and in helping make this, our 60th Diamond Anniversary, a positive experience in spite of all that we face. We look forward to your continued support as we navigate our way through the coming year. And when it is safe, we joyfully look forward to once again being there with you to share those important milestones of life.

### **Construction Update**

#### **New Buildings**

Construction work resumed on St. Louis Guanella Village

*May 15th.* According to John Franklin, AZ Shmina's construction superintendent who is overseeing the project, "Covid has really changed the work process. All contractors working onsite have

to provide a health assessment, have their temperature taken and sign in every day that they are here."

The new construction includes four- and sixbedroom cottages for residents currently living in Knights of Columbus



residents currently living in one of the new homes in the Village.

Hall located in the main building. Families who have a child with I/DD will also find a place to call home in the new single family and duplex homes located among the resident cottages. Across the street, a new administration building will provide space for current supervisors and staff, as well as a future leasing agent and security staff. Contractors are in the final stages of construction, finishing the drywall, installing cabinets, trimming and painting.

Furniture deliveries, landscaping and hydroseeding of the lawns are scheduled for August. Occupancy of the buildings is anticipated in the fall once the necessary permits have been received. Dedication of the new buildings, originally scheduled for June, will be held sometime in 2021.

#### **Renovations**

The main building at SLC, built in the 1960s, requires ongoing repair and maintenance.

Retaining Wall – Currently, work is underway to replace a retaining wall just outside of the kitchen and bus stop area. The wall was deteriorating and it, along with a staircase to the basement, are being replaced.





of a new air conditioning unit, will be completed by the end of July. This will provide much needed heating and cooling in the gym, which is seeing higher use during the COVID-19 pandemic, as residents must remain on campus.

Martin Hall – As the state lockdown orders ease, work is resuming on Martin Hall renovations. This will become much needed office space for the social work department, who look forward to occupying the new offices in late summer or early fall.

#### **Benevolent Care**

**Q:** What does "benevolent care" mean, and how was it established in the mission of SLC through St. Louis Guanella and the Servants of Charity Congregation?

**A:** "Our activity partakes in the mission of the Church, constituted and sent by Christ to pursue, in history, His work of evangelizing the poor and gathering the lost children of God. Following the example of Mary, Mother of Providence, we witness the merciful love of the Father through our charitable work. We represent Jesus, who healed the sick, did good for all and gave His life to reconcile people with God and among themselves. Our educational service is, therefore, a way of evangelizing and is our specific contribution to the mission of the Church." Basic Document for the Guanellian Mission, Premise.

So while many of the residents we care for are funded by state and county Community Mental Health agencies under contract, there are many more who have been placed here by their families, and others still who "have no one" to care for them. Several of these folks have been cared for since their early teens and consider St. Louis Center their forever home. They are here by their own choice, and whenever they've had the chance to leave, their wish has been to remain with their SLC "family." This is what benevolent care is all about, and where your donations are going when you help to fund our operations.

#### **Community Supports SLC**

**Q:** How does the community show support when SLC is in need of help?

**A:** There are many different ways, and certainly financial donations are very important. However "inkind" donations are very important as well. These contributions of goods and services are another way that SLC is able to save money, but still accomplish its mission. Here are a couple of examples of in-kind donations that occurred during our recent State of Emergency lock-down from COVID-19.

Hand Sanitizer – At the end of March, Rob Mida from Ugly Dog Distillery in Chelsea converted his operations from making alcoholic beverages to making hand sanitizer for people in the community who were in danger of running out. He generously donated two gallons of sanitizer valued at \$30 each to SLC, and when the supply ran low again on May 29th, he provided SLC with another two gallons to assist our staff and residents in fulfilling our sanitation protocols.


Danny maintains a strong bond with his parents and siblings. He hopes to join his friends in one of the work programs for persons with I/DD soon.
