## Resilience: Meet Matthias

Navigating life since Covid has proven that life doesn't always get easier, we get stronger and more resilient. SLC residents have especially felt the strain over the past nearly two years as life changed before their eyes. School, work, social time, and visits from those outside the Center stopped. The SLC residents not only rose to the occasion, but they also showed exactly how resilient and strong they are!

Matthias has been living at SLC since 2012 and brings happiness to everyone he meets. Greeting everyone with a smile or wave, he always faces the day with renewed joy and excitement. One of the greatest joys Matthias shares with those around him is his love for football, especially Michigan football and the Detroit Lions. Born in Brazil, Matthias and his family moved to the United States in 1989. Although he is nonverbal, he possesses enviable communication skills. Fluent in Brazilian and American Sign Language and spoken Brazilian Portuguese and English, Matthias has learned ways to communicate with the world around him.
While enrolled at Huron High School in Ann Arbor, he worked in the cafeteria filling ketchup and mustard bottles, salt and pepper shakers and wiping tables. These activities, plus learning work skills at Community Health

Services (CHS), gave him the base to get a job at Polly's Country Market in Chelsea as a bagger. He eagerly learned his job, despite setbacks. Bagging groceries is a skill that one must learn. With the help of his job coaches, Matthias quickly overcame the obstacles and worked even harder to make his job work for him. "Matthias is so proud of being employed, taking the bus with one of his close friends from SLC, and getting a paycheck. His enthusiasm is contagious, and his satisfaction is immense. He takes care of his shirt with Polly's logo and his ID card" his parents stated.
Typically, Matthias does not deal well with change, such as returning to SLC after a weekend home. However, as soon as he is reminded of his job and responsibility, he gets ready for the trip. SLC is his "home away from home". SLC residents overcome the obstacles laid in front of them; their resilience is astounding.

## Happy Fall!

In the last issue of the St. Louis Spirit newsletter I mentioned that we were moving forward. Since then the former children's houses have been licensed as Adult Foster Care (AFC). They are fully functional and offer opportunities for more independent living arrangements. Some of the residents, after shopping, cook their own meals, and, under the supervision of the direct care professionals, clean their house.

SLC is still committed to offering benevolent care to those individuals who don't have the financial resources for their stay at the Center due to family financial constraints or who don't qualify for public assistance. The Center is able to provide benevolent care because of your generosity in helping us carry out the daily activities and services needed to proclaim the dignity of the lives of people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD).

I want to thank some specific groups and individuals who have recently gone the extra mile in raising funds for the Center; Mike Chirco, Sam Cottone and Joe Maniaci for organizing the Lad and Dad Golf Outing; Nino and Sonny Randazzo of Randazzo Fresh Market, the Fall Harvest Fest committee; the KofC State Council for contributing funds to offset the cost of a new well; the many donors who pledged their support for the security cameras; also some politicians who were able to facilitate substantial financial support from the State government for SLC.

After months of on-going work to prepare the proper documentation, agreements and marketing, on November 1, 2021 the first occupant of a family home in St. Louis Guanella Village will be moving in. This event brings the vision of an integrated village which we had planned some time ago to fruition; people with I/DD and those without living next to each other.

Still moving forward in up-grading the infrastructure of the Center, we are planning to upgrade St. Joseph Hall, which was built in 1984 and is showing signs of aging. Also, the original kitchen built in 1960 needs to be brought up to today's standards. Please follow us for more news in this regard in the future.

## Update on Covid-19 Mitigation at St. Louis Center

All individuals who received the Pfizer, Moderna or J\&J vaccines are eligible for a booster injection now, if it has been at least 6 months since their second injection. People who have underlying health conditions, such as diabetes or high blood pressure, are over 65 or work in an environment which has a high risk of exposure are encouraged to seek out a booster at their local health department or pharmacy.
Here at SLC, we have established which of our residents are in need of a 3rd dose. Now that the Moderna vaccine is approved for booster doses, we will be reaching out to families to seek out their approval for the booster dose. We will not be able to have large clinics here like we ran before, so we are in the process of setting up a way to provide the boosters.
People should talk to their healthcare provider about their medical condition, and whether getting an additional dose or a booster is appropriate for them.

Independence can be seen as a continuum, with total dependence at one end and complete independence at the other extreme. No one is completely independent in all areas, which also goes for people with I/DD. However, one can aim at guiding people with I/DD toward the most optimal level of independence that is attainable for an individual. To create a better understanding of how to promote independence in people with I/DD, perspectives need to be obtained from those whom it concerns the most, which are people with I/DD and those who support them. This is exactly what Mohr set out to do. She met with a core group of residents at SLC and talked with them about their ambitions, hopes, dreams and desires. She then set up a program based on what they felt they needed.
The happiness and the knowledge that this young group of people has developed has empowered them to seek and grow in ways that they never knew was possible.

## The Legacy of a Saint

Fr. Guanella's vision extended beyond his time to movements that are of concern to Catholics even today - social action, education, youth movements and the lay apostolate.
The dignity of the human person was a priority in all of Fr. Guanella's works. In particular, he wanted to maintain this dignity for those who were considered society's outcasts.
Often the old, incurable and the physically and mentally handicapped were left in pitiable condition by relatives who had no desire or knowledge of how to give them this human dignity. Eventually, he established homes for their care and founded the Servants of Charity and the Daughters of St. Mary of Providence to staff them.
He believed that each human life has value because it is a gift from God, and that it cannot be measured by its achievements. When he died, he left the residents of his

homes, "good children," to his priests and sisters as most precious gifts, his treasures.
"His life was a continuous journey of love for God and humanity, by giving himself in a special way to the most in need of this world, to pass on to them the fatherly love of Our Father who is in heaven. The public recognition of his holiness by the Church is particularly meaningful to show the world that it is possible to establish the kingdom of God among men, even among the least in our present society." (Fr. Umberto Brugnoni, Superior General of the Servants of Charity, October 18, 2021) On October 23rd this year, we celebrated the 10th Anniversary of the Canonization of St. Louis Guanella for whom the St. Louis Center is named. May his legacy continue to inspire all who take part in this mission of mercy as residents, staff, families, friends or donors.
