Seeing that there was a need for residents to learn skills that would help them be more independent in their lives, the Social Services Department at the Center formatted a "college" type lesson plan. 10 residents participated.

One goal of Independence College was achieved just days before

graduation when the last of the graduating residents were able to move into their cottage home on the Center's campus. This new home provides the male graduates with the opportunity to show their newly acquired skills. The ladies who graduated were first to move in the fall of 2021.

On April 28th, after a year of hard work and preparation, the 10 St. Louis Center Independence College graduates took to the stage surrounded by family and friends who gathered to celebrate their accomplishments.

Fr. Franklin led prayer to begin the ceremony. "Tonight, we are here on behalf of the graduates of Independence College Class of 2022", said Sheryl Mohr, Social Services Supervisor, welcoming guests as the graduates were seated near the podium.

Gary Piper, transporter at St. Louis Center, made a heartwarming speech about respecting those around us and trusting Jesus to bring us JOY. Deana Fisher, COO of St. Louis Center congratulated the graduates and dedicated a special thank you for the important role that the Social Services Department plays in giving the residents the skills that they need to gain more independence. Cheers filled the room as each resident was commended for their hard work. Each resident received a certificate to commemorate their accomplishment.

Many people have dedicated their lives to the well-being of St. Louis Center. One of these persons is Fr. Joseph Rinaldo (Fr. Joe for many).

He came to Chelsea in September 1980 and moved back to Italy in May 2022.

He achieved many landmarks during his tenure: construction of St. Joseph Hall, the remodeling of the main building, construction of Fr. Guanella Hall, the purchasing of the property in Grass Lake that eventually became the site for

the Pious Union of St. Joseph and the transformation of the old barn into a chapel/shrine.

He was also instrumental in the vision of the St. Louis Guanella Village at St. Louis Center.

Activities with benefactors started to be solidified, including the creation of the Fall Dinner Auction and the Memorial Golf Outing, as well as establishing many contacts with local politicians and other agencies.

The quarterly newsletter is the fruit of his vision as well as reaching out to other agencies and people and the establishment of the endowment trust fund.

The Center has gained a lot of recognition. He has given the basis of what the Center is today as a thriving facility poised for the future.

His Heart; doing so, our mission of hope and love for society will continue.

SLC COMMUNITY ADVISORY COUNCIL

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FR. JOSEPH RINALDO, SDC



Growing up in Naro, Italy, on the island of Sicily helped to form strong family bonds for Joseph Rinaldo. His parents maintained a traditional home life for their children. His father was a farmer and a prominent figure in town who could always be counted on when there were people in need.

Joseph and his family witnessed the horrors of WWII while the Allies and Axis powers battled for control of his native island. The foundation of faith and commitment to the good of your neighbor was firmly planted into every part of Joseph's character and remains with him to this day.

After the war as daily life began to normalize, Joseph, his siblings, and cousins returned to school. He had

one cousin that was about the same age who had special needs. She was never without Joseph to be her protector and guide. This special relationship helped to foster his

attraction to the charism of St. Louis Guanella (1842-1915), the priest who founded the Servants of Charity Congregation, which cares for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities as well as the frail elderly.

Once Joseph completed his primary schooling, he was able to go to Rome to attend pre-seminary schooling.

Once high school was finished, he decided to enter the novitiate to become a priest for the Servants of Charity, making his first profession in 1959. His next step was theology studies in Chiavenna in 1963.

Fr. Joseph was ordained on December 21, 1967. In September 1968 the Superior General, Fr. Armando Budino, decided to send him to America. So, Fr. Joseph made his way to Don Guanella School in Springfield, PA. In Springfield, Fr. Joseph helped to build a thriving community of services for persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities that remains an important part of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia's programming.

Fr. Joseph was assigned to St. Louis Center for the first time in 1980,

discovering a facility with many needs. He got busy right away looking for creative ways to provide for the needs of the Center. New construction began, and St. Louis Center as we know it today began to take shape.

With the

With the establishment

of the Servants of Charity Vice-Province, Fr. Joseph was appointed as 1st councilor. A few years later, he was elected Vice-Province Superior. During the same time, he was also the treasurer which continued after the establishment of the Divine Providence Province until he retired from such

duties. His duties as treasurer made it necessary to travel to faraway India, Philippines, and Vietnam on a regular basis but he remained the superior of the community in Chelsea MI.

When Fr. Joe wasn't traveling, he spent countless hours translating and publishing books for and about St. Louis Guanella and the Servants of Charity. For several years he was



the director of the Pious Union of St. Joseph in Grass Lake MI and editor-in-chief of *Now and at the Hour* magazine.

After celebrating his 50th Anniversary of Ordination, growing a large group of Guanellian Cooperators, and mentoring Fr. Franklin, Fr. Amal, and Fr. Leo Joseph, it was time for Fr. Joe to

step back and watch the next generation of Guanellian priests thrive in the places that he worked so hard to build. The congregation decided to allow Fr. Joe to return to Italy for his retirement.

On Sunday, March 21st there was a farewell gathering.

At the event, St. Louis Center received a generous donation from Michael Chirco's Living Trust that amounted to \$100,000, in Fr. Joe's honor.


