This story begins our series of Stories That Inspire: Perseverance. Perseverance is persistence in doing something despite difficulty or delay in achieving success. Lee and Keegan both show us how to have strength and that achieving success takes hard work and perseverance.

Lee Booth moved to St. Louis Center when he was eight years old. After he completed school at the age of 26, he began attending the work programs offered by the county.

Lee really wanted to have a job and earn a paycheck, just like some of his housemates. After trying a few places, Lee finally found a job that he loved: washing dishes at the local Big Boy restaurant. Unfortunately for them both, the Covid-19 pandemic shuttered the doors to Big Boy and thus to Lee's job.

After things started to re-open, Karin Brandt, St. Louis Center Social Services Specialist, started to help Lee look for other opportunities. Lee's mother, Christine Okler, was hopeful.

She had worked in the employment industry and kept her eyes peeled for opportunities for her son.

Keegan Rodgers had a lifelong dream of owning his own bakery that stemmed from baking cookies with his grandmother. In 2010 he graduated with honors from the Culinary Baking and Pastry Arts Program at Schoolcraft College. Many accolades later, he purchased a

bakery in Chelsea! His lifelong dream had become a reality.

Keegan's business was growing and thriving. Then came 2020. Keegan knew he needed to keep baking to not only provide for himself but also his loyal employees. The bakery never closed throughout the pandemic. His perseverant staff helped keep the business afloat.

Keegan also knew that he wanted to give opportunities

to persons with disabilities. Thanks to Dick Dice, a member of the Chelsea Rotary Club and Saturday Morning Challengers volunteer, Keegan was introduced to Lee. Now Lee works side-by-side with Keegan

assisting with dishes and clean-up around the bakery.

## FROM FR. ENZO



During the 50th anniversary celebration, a decision was made to bring the Center to a new level of services.

Thus, a legacy committee was formed and money started to be raised in order to build the St. Louis Guanella

Village and to renovate the existing buildings.

The Village has started to take shape with new cottages built and homes for people from the community, thus creating an integrated village where people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and people without live next to each other enriching everyone.

Following this trend very soon we will remodel St. Joseph Hall, reducing the number of people living in this home and giving them the opportunity to have a personal, single room to foster the sense of belonging and to have something that is for self. Work will start at Christmas time and will be completed in a few months.

Another project will be underway soon as well: the main kitchen, designed at the end of the 50's, needs a major renovation in order to address all the food preparation needs.

New residents have been enrolled into the SLC residential programs.

We are shaping the day program with the hiring of a day program coordinator; thus, we are able to serve those residents who need services as well people from the community whose guardians are looking for meaningful activities for their loved ones during the day.

All the fund-raising committees are working very hard (I thank all the members for this) to raise the amount of money needed for the daily operation of the Center (\$19,178.00 a day, which is \$10,137.00 of earned revenue and \$9,041.00 in donations). I want to thank all of you for being the caring hand of God for those 'who are precious in His sight' and for giving us the encouragement to be a lighthouse of hope for many people.


## **MICHAEL JOSEPH ROBINSON** A LETTER RECOUNTING A ST. LOUIS CENTER SUCCESS STORY

### **REMEMBERING OUR FRIENDS**


