## **RESIDENTS FLOURISH IN THE ARTS**

The residents really enjoy the chance to express themselves in creative ways. Here are two programs at the Center now:

Theatre classes are designed for everyone, from students with developmental disabilities to seniors. Since 2012, Open Spot Theatre has proudly taught people of ALL abilities music and movement therapy. Singing, acting, and dancing are included in all the programs, along with sign language interpretations.

St. Louis Center paired with Open Spot Theatre before 2020, but the pandemic put a damper on allowing the program. One resident's parent, Amy Lothamer, actively raises funds to bring this program back after seeing the benefits of music and dance in her daughter's life.

The second performance of 2023 was on August 21st. With the help of Open Spot Theatre, the residents crafted a play about taking a long road trip from their home to

California. The group enjoyed their trip and ended the performance with a musical number of 'Here Comes the Sun' that was performed vocally and in sign language.

It was a touching experience for all who were involved, and the night ended with the crowd cheering and many smiles filled the room.

#### Eli Zemper of Curiouser Clay

approached the Center to discuss the possibility of a partnership to give residents a new creative outlet. In October, St. Louis Center began offering a new clay program to residents! The Day Program has the opportunity to partake in the weekly class.

During this season, we celebrate the feast day of St. Louis Guanella (October 24th), whose vision and mission are carried out here at St. Louis Center. We serve people with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities, who

# DOMINIC SAMUEL BOMMARITO

## **RANDAZZO LEGACY LIVES ON**

ANTONINO 'NINO' RANDAZZO founded Randazzo Fresh Market in 1972. Nino and his beloved wife Giovanna "Joann", raised two children whom they taught the value of hard work and community involvement.

In 2014, Nino met Fr. Enzo at an event in Macomb County and promised to do something to help St. Louis Center. Six months later, the first Men's Social was held at Randazzo's Fresh Market.

The family was devastated when Nino passed away on September

14th of this year. Just one week before the annual event.

The Randazzo family recently hosted the 8th Annual Men's Social at their Macomb Township store to keep Nino's legacy alive. They prepared some of the finest foods from the Italian traditions. Sonny Randazzo, the main event organizer, said, "My dad may have passed away, but he would want us to continue."

Nino was 83 years old.

## **CARING FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES** CREATING EFFECTIVE MEMORY INTERVENTIONS

Persons with dementia often demonstrate responsive behaviors that are in response to an unmet human need. These behaviors are not "caused" by a disease and are a form of communication. Agitation, refusing to accept

help, saying "I want to go home," – these are examples of responsive behaviors often seen in persons with dementia. This can be intensified in people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

#### Also important ...

Although closely interconnected, it is important to remember that emotion and memory are two distinct systems of the brain. For persons with dementia, short term memory capacity may decline, but the way emotions are experienced is just as "real" as ever.

### Responding to Behavioral Symptoms of Dementia

Are you providing care to someone with dementia who seems agitated or refuses help? They may be frustrated at their inability to communicate effectively and meet their own needs.

#### Here's how you can help:

**Approach from the front** - introduce yourself and speak clearly using simple sentences.

**Remain calm** - focus on positive behavior. Ask in a respectful and curious way why they are doing what they're doing.

**Reduce chaos** - try encouraging them to go into a different room, or turn down the TV volume.

**Support feelings** - identify feelings behind words or actions. Say something like, "I'm sorry you are frustrated right now."

**Determine cause** - ask respectfully if they are hungry, bored, in pain, or stressed.

**Do something they enjoy** - look at pictures of family or look out the window. You could ask them to tell stories or jokes.



## REMEMBERING OUR FRIENDS

Mary Galasso was born on January 3, 1938 in Detroit, Michigan to Raymond and Catherine Doemer. She met Mario, the love of her life at an early age at the five and dime. They fell in love and later married on October 6, 1956, at St. Rita's Catholic Church. After starting their family, Mary and Mario moved away from Detroit to the suburbs to make Livonia their home where they established a network of friends that remain close and connected.

Mary was the first and only female President, to date, of the Italian American Club in Livonia. Mario and Mary were lifetime members. Mary gave her time, talents and treasure by leading the

committee for the Guardian Angel fundraising event which is held at the Italian American Banquet

Center to benefit St. Louis Center. She was committed to serve individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Mary was the epitome of a caregiver; it was who she was. She faithfully devoted herself to Mario's health and care. She was a friend to everyone she met; and was always there to check in on you.

Mary died at age 85 on September 25, 2023.
