

Fr. Joseph Rinaldo, SdC

Fr. Joseph Rinaldo passed away December 16, 2025 at the age of 85. Fr. Joe's dedication to serving those in need and his commitment to building communities of care demonstrated the profound impact one individual could make on the world. His life's journey stood as a testament to the power of compassion, perseverance, and faith in creating lasting positive change. Fr. Joseph's kindness and thoughtfulness,

as remembered by the staff of St. Louis Center, revealed that he was not only a religious leader, but also a living example of compassion and care. His death marked a profound loss for the residents, staff, and supporters of the Center. His life of service remains a powerful reminder of how one individual can positively change the world, and his legacy continues to inspire others to follow in his footsteps.

THE HEART OF THE SEASON

Their dedication—and the resources that make this level of care possible—resulted in one of the strongest performances in recent memory.

The St. Louis Center gym filled to capacity as families, friends, and community members gathered in support. Fr. Satheesh welcomed guests, Fr. Franklin opened the event with prayer, and Carlie introduced the program's new theme—a Jeopardy-style game show that brought energy and connection to the room.

Through traditional Christmas songs, poetry, and

THE GIFT OF THE CARPENTER

Russell "Russ" Payeur passed away peacefully at his home in Saline, Michigan, on December 3, 2025. Russ and his wife Kay have been longtime supporters of the Center. One of the homes in the Village bears their name. The entire St. Louis Center community offers heartfelt condolences to Kay and her family.



Russ was born December 27, 1936, in Ann Arbor, he was the third of four children of Harry and Marie-Louise Payeur. After graduating from St. Thomas Catholic School, Russ served his country in the U.S. Army before returning home to work alongside his father and brother in the family business, A.H. Payeur & Sons Foundation Company, where he remained until his retirement in 1995.

Russ's greatest pride was his family. He shared 66 years of marriage with his beloved wife, Kay, and was a devoted father, grandfather, and great-grandfather who took genuine interest in the lives of those he

loved. Quietly attentive rather than outwardly sentimental, he showed his care through presence, conversation, and steady support.

In retirement, Russ poured his creativity into woodworking, antique cars, maple syrup making, and restoring Model Ts—always doing things the right

way, even when it was the hard way. His exquisitely detailed wooden models reflected both his craftsmanship and his generosity; many were donated to the St. Louis Center so others could experience the joy they brought him.

Russ found God in the woods, joy in honest work, and meaning in family. A mentor, leader, and friend, he will be remembered for the life he built with his hands, his heart, and his unwavering devotion to those he loved.

CARING FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

THE POWER OF MUSIC THERAPY

St. Louis Center has partnered with Harmony Garden Music Therapy since 2015, providing services that improve the quality of life for all the residents.

Music therapy is a powerful and effective tool for supporting the well-being of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. At St. Louis Center, music therapist Renae Murphy of Harmony Garden Music Therapy

Services works with residents through weekly group and individual sessions that promote communication, emotional expression, motor skills, and social connection.

Renae's pathway to board certification started with a four-year bachelor's degree, hundreds of observation hours, and a 1,200-hour clinical internship. After completing the steps, she successfully passed the certification exam. This rigorous preparation ensures that music therapy is not recreational, but evidence-based and intentional.

Each session is guided by clinical goals, whether that means practicing turn-taking, strengthening fine motor skills through instrument play, or building focus and memory through song writing. Residents often show increased

engagement and positive mood during music therapy, and staff regularly report improved attention and interaction on days when sessions are offered.

Music therapy also meets people where they are. Some residents thrive

in energetic group music making, while others benefit most from quiet, one-on-one sessions or instrumental improvisation. As a calm, neutral guide, the music therapist offers consistency and emotional safety, allowing clients to explore and express feelings without pressure or expectation.

While offered once a week, music therapy's benefits could grow even further with additional sessions. The impact is clear: music therapy nurtures joy, dignity, and meaningful connection, one note at a time.



Benefits of Music Therapy

- Mental and Emotional** - reduces stress and anxiety, alleviates depression, enhances emotional expression, improves coping skills and boosts self-confidence.
- Physical** - manages pain, improves motor skills, supports physiological regulation.
- Cognitive and Social** - enhances memory and cognition, strengthens communication, builds social skills.

Music Therapy Methods

- Receptive** - passively receiving music, either live or recorded, to promote relaxation, memory recall, or emotional processing.
- Re-creative** - singing familiar songs or playing familiar melodies on an instrument, can build confidence and provide a sense of accomplishment.
- Improvisational** - spontaneous music is created with the therapist, allowing for immediate emotional expression, non-verbal communication, and exploration of feelings in the moment.
- Compositional** - actively creating new music, such as writing lyrics or composing melodies, to help process experiences and build self-esteem.

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
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REMEMBERING OUR FRIENDS
